Refugees 2020: know the facts 1*

There are worldwide:

- 70.8 million displaced people (those who have fled their home but remain within their country's borders). 2.3 million more than a year ago. Only 5% of those fleeing their homes move beyond their country's borders.
- 25.9 million refugees (people who have fled their own country and are seeking refuge elsewhere).
 0.5 million more than a year ago. 80% of refugees flee to an adjacent country, living mostly in refugee camps.
- 3.5 million registered asylum seekers (up 0.4m) (refugees who have sought asylum from another country). Venezuela generated the greatest number of asylum seekers in 2018.
- 3.9 million stateless people (people without nationality)

This means:

- 37,000 people (one every two seconds) are forced to leave their homes every day (down from 44,000) through conflict or war.
- Half of all refugees are under 18 of which 173,800 are unaccompanied children.

57% of the worlds refugees come from:

- ♦ Syrian Arab Republic (6.7 million)
- ♦ Afghanistan (2.7 million)
- ♦ South Sudan (2.3 million)

Additionally, many persecuted groups, such as the Uighurs in China, are unable to flee their countries.

(UK: 0.53) i.e. Lebanon has taken in nearly 294 times the number (per head of population) than the UK.

Only a tiny proportion (1%) of refugees are resettled in a new country; most will remain in refugee camps from which many will eventually return home. A number continue to live in other countries, often illegally, as *stateless people* (without legal protection from any country). India, for example, has passed a new law that gives asylum only to those who belong to non-Muslim religions, leaving thousands as 'illegal' refugees or settlers .

Europe

- ♦ In 2019 333,400 refugees applied for asylum in Europe. 20,325 (3%) were unaccompanied minors.
- The following countries gave asylum (per 1,000,000 of the local population):

- The Eastern European country level was low (mostly in double figures).
- ◆ The UK ranks 17 in order of European countries accepting refugees as a percentage of population.
- Over 1000 people died in the Mediterranean in 2019.
- The Calais camp was destroyed in 2016. At it's peak there were 10,000 refugees there. Abut 1000-1500 refugees are still in and around Calais/ Dunkirk. A number are children who had hoped to cross to the UK under the 'Dubs' amendment' scheme (the Government has since closed this scheme).

Rich and Poor

The **poorest nations** of the world shoulder most of the relief work (80% of refugees are in developing nations).

(Overall) the **poorest countries** in Europe (Greece, Spain and Italy) have taken most of the refugees arriving here.

The UK is the world's 6th richest nation in the world but accepts **0.026% of the world's refugees**.

UK

 18,519 people were given refugee protection in the UK (2018-19)
 4,563 of which were children.

i.e. 0.27% of the world's refugees

 The total number of refugees (and those seeking asylum) in the UK is 171,964.

i.e. 0.6% of the UKs population

 The UK refuses 62% of initial asylum applications. 40% of those appealing win their cases

The poorest towns and local authority areas have accepted most of the refugees in the UK. No 1 is Glasgow, 2 is Stockton on Tees and 3 is Middlesbrough.

90 of 392 (mainly Conservative) local authorities have not resettled any refugees. The richest 1/3 of local authorities house only 10% of asylum seekers.

Craven

Craven welcomed 29 Syrian refugees (i.e. 0.05% of Craven population) under the Syrian Vulnerable Person's Scheme but have not housed any asylum seekers (compared to 800 housed by Bradford). Craven is one of the richest areas of the country (top 1/3).
